This issue includes the council's budget setting, new free fraud packs available to communities, and we need your help to decide where new electric vehicle charging locations should be sited in the county.



Investing in our communities despite financial challenges

Updated budget proposals include over £7m of extra funding for flooding, highways, anti-social behaviour and the environment.

On Friday 23 February, the council set its budget for the 2024/25 financial year. Following additional, one-off funding from the government, the authority now plans to invest a further £7.8m in these priority areas. This is on top of the £646m the council plans to spend providing its wide range of vital services, such as adult care and children's services.

Does your area need more Electric Vehicle chargers?

Help us identify new electric vehicle charging locations for your area.

The government has set up the Local Electric Vehicle Infrastructure (LEVI) fund to provide on-street car charging for people with no access to off-street parking. We are embarking on our next phase of delivering the infrastructure Lincolnshire residents need, and we need your help.

To ensure we get the charge points where they are most needed, we are reaching out to town and parish councils to help us identify suitable locations to be considered for EV charge points in the future. Lincolnshire alone is likely to need more than 4000 charge points by 2030, and we want to make sure that everyone in Lincolnshire has fair access to the correct infrastructure when they need it.

We would also like your thoughts on sustainable travel more widely, and any infrastructure needs you can identify within your town or parish which would help your residents travel more sustainably. This could be any infrastructure from cycle stands, more footpaths to improved bus stops.

Protecting our communities from serious violence

A new strategy for preventing serious violence within local communities has been unveiled by the Safer Lincolnshire Partnership.

In anticipation of the Serious Violence Duty (2023), serious violence was added to the strategic priorities of the partnership, alongside fraud, anti-social behaviour, drug and alcohol-related issues and reducing reoffending.

The new Serious Violence Prevention Strategy sets out how partner organisations will deliver against both their own pre-identified focus areas and national measures.

It will build on the strong foundation of work already being carried out to better protect Lincolnshire communities.
