Council Tax Support Scheme increased to support struggling families in Boston

Families with no or low income in Boston Borough will be entitled to full council tax support from April 2025.

Boston Borough Council has unanimously voted to increase the amount of Council Tax Support available to low or no income households with children from 75 per cent to 100 per cent.

This is to help ease the financial burden for families struggling to make ends meet.

Around one in three children in Boston Borough live in low-income households. Currently 1,109 households with children receive council tax support, of which 727 receive the maximum award.

The Council also voted to increase the maximum amount of Council Tax Support eligibility for other households from 75 to 85 per cent as well as the creation of an Exceptional Hardship Fund.

The decision follows a fundamental review of the Council Tax Support Scheme and included a public consultation with residents, organisations and other authorities who set council tax. The changes to the Council Tax Support Scheme will come into effect in April 2025.

Demolition underway for Boston's Rosegarth Square redevelopment

Demolition of an empty shop unit and a former office block in Boston Town Centre is now underway, marking a major milestone in the Rosegarth Square redevelopment project.

Over the coming weeks, visitors will witness the removal of the former B&M store and Crown House building, previously housing the job centre.

The project, led by Boston Borough Council and initially funded by £14.8 million Government fund, aims to transform the area between the River Witham and the bus station into a vibrant public space with a new park, public art, housing, and retail opportunities.

Independent Persons vacancies

Boston Borough Council, East Lindsey District Council and South Holland District Council, which collectively form the South & East Lincolnshire Councils Partnership, are looking to appoint 'Independent Persons' to support the work of the Councils. Boston and East Lindsey will be considering the appointment of lead and reserve Independent Persons whilst South Holland has a vacancy for a reserve Independent Person.

The role of the Independent Person involves providing an objective and impartial view on Code of Conduct complaints received against District/Borough Members and Town/Parish Councillors. In addition, Independent Persons are appointed to a Panel for the purposes of advising the authorities on matters that arise relating to the dismissal of relevant officers of the authority.

Applicants should have a good understanding of the ethical standards required of persons holding public office, demonstrate high standards of personal integrity and be able to make judgements based on evidence or information presented.

Providing a lifeline for families fleeing war and conflict

In March 2023, Boston Borough Council announced it had secured Round 1 Government funding to purchase a number of family-sized homes through the LAHF scheme, followed by further funding from Round 2 later that year. Designed to ease pressure on housing and homelessness services, the scheme ensures that support for local households remains unaffected while providing a safe haven for those fleeing war zones.

The initiative focused on families resettling in the UK after supporting British armed forces in Afghanistan, as well as Ukrainian refugees at risk of homelessness. Twelve properties have now been occupied by Afghan and Ukrainian families, with a further property being used to support local families in need of short-term accommodation prior to moving on into longer

term housing. Many of these families have since embarked on employment or training, contributing to their new communities.

For the purposes of clarity, the LAHF scheme is not aimed at households who have arrived in the UK illegally, outside of government sponsored resettlement schemes. It is not aimed at households and individuals seeking asylum in the UK.

Councillor John Baxter, Portfolio Holder for Housing at Boston Borough Council, said: "The funding we secured from the Government enabled Boston to play a crucial role in supporting families who have endured unimaginable hardship. These families have been warmly welcomed by our community, and securing stable housing has allowed them to rebuild their lives while easing pressure on local housing and homelessness services."

Beyond providing immediate support, the Council's purchase of these homes will leave a lasting legacy. The properties will eventually bolster the borough's permanent housing supply, helping to address local housing challenges and support residents for years to come.

This achievement underscores Boston's commitment to compassionate resettlement efforts while maintaining vital services for local residents in need.

Owners of former Post Office ordered to carry out essential repairs following legal notice

Boston Borough Council has had a legal notice upheld by the courts, ordering the owners of the town's former Post Office to renovate the historic landmark.

The Grade II listed property on Wide Bargate has been closed since 2014 when the Post Office relocated services to WH Smith's.

In October 2022, the Council granted planning consent to Red Lion Wide Bargate Ltd to turn it into 22 apartments as well as commercial space on the ground floor.

The following year, the Council started to receive regular complaints about the building's poor condition.

The Council contacted Red Lion Wide Bargate Limited and were told renovation and repairs would begin in April 2024, however this did not happen.

In June last year, the Council served a formal notice on the owners, instructing for the necessary works to begin to improve the appearance of the property and to preserve it from further decay.

Red Lion Wide Bargate Ltd, formally appealed against the notice, stating the poor condition was justified, that the works the Council required were considered excessive and that the time frame to carry out the works was insufficient.

Ahead of the court hearing as part of the formal appeal process, the owners formally withdrew two grounds. The appeal sought extra time for the works and asked for the renovations to start in February 2025.

On 20 December last year, Boston Magistrates Court found the Council were fully justified in taking the action, however it accepted the owner should be granted more time to comply. The court upheld the requirements to improve and repair the building, with an extended deadline for the works to be carried out until September 2025.

For almost 30 years, the Government been helping to keep communities safe through our flood warning service.

Over 1.6 million people across England currently receive warnings, giving them time to protect themselves from the impacts of flooding. This year, they are taking a big step to modernise this vital service to ensure it can securely and reliably warn our communities for the next decade.

In late summer 2025, they are launching a completely refreshed system to create and manage flood warnings. This includes a brand-new 'Get flood warnings' digital service on GOV.UK, making it easier than ever for the public, organisations, and partners to stay informed about flooding. You can see the improvements they're introducing in our recent show and shares.

Before launching the replacement service, they're looking for around 1,000 people to test it between February and May 2025. Feedback from potential users will be invaluable in shaping this crucial service. They are inviting staff to help share the testing opportunity with their networks and to volunteer themselves.

WhatsApp channels offer users a secure and private way to follow what matters to them, subscribing for free to news from their favourite organisations and celebrities. Channel admins and fellow followers don't have access to personal information such as names,

profile photos, or numbers. Followers can set notifications to read messages in real-time and, if they choose, respond with a simple emoji or vote in a poll.
