Cllr Pierpoint was proposed by Cllr Anne Dorrian, Leader of the Council and seconded by Cllr Dale Broughton, Deputy Leader, at the Council's Annual General Meeting tonight, Monday 19th May 2025.

In accepting the great honour, he said he is committed to being a "People's Mayor".

He said: "It is a privilege and a duty that I take to heart as I am deeply committed with passion, dedication, respect and integrity to carry out my entrusted Mayoral duties for this coming year." Cllr Pierpoint is well known across Boston Borough as well as the wider region for his community, charity, business and Councillor work. # Historic timepiece resurfaces: 165-year-old watch from U.S. shipwreck returns to Boston

A historic gold watch discovered in a shipwreck belonging to Bostonian Herbert Ingram has been returned to the town after 165 years — a photo is attached.

Discovered in the wreck of the Lady Elgin at the bottom of Lake Michigan, the watch was officially handed over to Boston Guildhall on Saturday during a commemorative event celebrating Ingram's life and legacy.

The day began with a private tribute at Ingram's grave in Boston Cemetery, where a select group, including The Worshipful the Mayor of Boston, Cllr Barrie Pierppoint, honoured the legacy of the pioneering journalist, publisher and politician.

This was followed by a ceremonial gathering at the Ingram Memorial outside Boston Stump, where the watch was officially gifted to the town by Valerie Lafferty Van Heest. It was accepted by the Mayor, Cllr Barrie Pierpoint.

Guests then toured the historic church and reflected on Ingram's lasting contributions to the town, including his role in securing a clean water supply—symbolised by his Market Place statue. Following this, the newly curated Ingram Exhibition was unveiled at Boston Guildhall. The centrepiece of the exhibition is the recovered watch: a 16-carat gold pocket watch, complete with a matching gold chain and fob. The fob features a striking black sardonyx stone, a material used since Roman times for wax seals due to its non-stick surface. The watch bears a delicate engraving linking it directly to Herbert Ingram, making it a deeply personal and historically significant artefact.

Despite spending over a century and a half submerged in the cold depths of Lake Michigan, the watch was remarkably well-preserved within the shattered remains of the Lady Elgin. Experts believe the cold, low-oxygen environment helped protect the gold casing and sardonyx fob from significant corrosion.

# Public Realm work begins as part of Boston's Rosegarth regeneration

Backed by £14.8 million in Government funding, the Rosegarth Square regeneration initiative received planning approval in late 2024, with initial site activity commencing in January 2025. The project aims to revitalise the area into a vibrant, multi-functional public space stretching from the St Botolph's footbridge to the Len Medlock Centre.

The redesigned public realm will feature a blend of relocated and newly commissioned artworks, inviting social spaces, and a reimagined entrance and drop-off zone for the Len Medlock Centre. A highlight will be amphitheatre-style seating area for community gatherings and events. Demolition and asbestos removal work at the former Crown House and B&M buildings was successfully completed in April, with construction partner Lindum since extending the site hoarding to pave the way for the next stage of development.

This regeneration marks a significant step forward in creating a more inclusive, accessible, and inspiring space for the community.

# Food waste recycling in Lincolnshire

Starting in 2026, Lincolnshire will introduce weekly food waste collections as part of the Government's Environment Act 2021, helping reduce greenhouse gas emissions and support the UK's net zero goals.

- All residents will receive:
- An outdoor food waste caddy
- A smaller indoor kitchen caddy
- An initial roll of liners
- A welcome pack

Instead of being burned with general waste, your food waste will be sent to a local anaerobic digestion plant. There, it's transformed into renewable energy to power homes and businesses, and nutrient-rich fertiliser to support local farming — creating a closed-loop system that benefits everyone.

Additionally, Boston Borough Council has taken a significant step forward in preparing for the introduction of weekly food waste collections by April 2026, following Cabinet approval to place an order for 14 new refuse vehicles with integrated food waste collection pods.

The move supports the requirements of the Environment Act 2021 and its Simpler Recycling reforms, which mandate separate weekly food waste collections for all households. By investing in vehicles that allow food waste to be collected at the same time as general waste and recycling, the Council is delivering a solution that is both cost-effective and operationally efficient.

The Council's decision ensures it meets its legal obligations while maximising value for money.

The Council's decision ensures it meets its legal obligations while maximising value for money. Using a single vehicle to collect multiple waste streams reduces the number of vehicles needed, supports the recruitment and retention of drivers, and simplifies the service for residents.

# Boston Borough sees drop in Fly-Tipping reports as community and partnership work pays off

Boston Borough Council has recorded a 7% reduction in recorded fly-tipping incidents over the past 12 months, bucking the national trend which saw overall reports increase across the country. Between April 2024 and March 2025, the Council logged 391 fewer incidents than the previous year — showing that ongoing efforts are beginning to make a tangible difference. Between April 2024 and March 2025, the Council logged 391 fewer incidents than the previous year — showing that ongoing efforts are beginning to make a tangible difference.

One of the most notable improvements has been a significant drop in mattress dumping, with 359 mattresses collected compared to 516 the year before — the lowest number since 2021/22. This encouraging shift is credited to strengthened relationships with local landlords, housing associations, and social housing partners.

However, the data also revealed a substantial increase in textile-related fly-tipping, which has prompted the Council to begin further investigation into the root causes of this rise.

## Successful Climate Change & Environment Day at Boston Endeavour Academy

Partnership officers organised and hosted a successful climate change and environment day with pupils at Boston Endeavour Academy on Wednesday 21 May.

The South & East Lincolnshire Partnership's Home Energy Advice and Retrofit

Team, representatives from waste management and envirocrime enforcement were there, along with 'Steve the Street Sweeper' and 'Barry the Bin Lorry' vehicles provided by Boston Borough Council for the children to see.

The Partnership's Energy and Retrofit Information Clinic (ERIC) was also at the school, where the pupils could see for themselves the home energy measures the van demonstrates.

The opportunity to host the day was made possible following links created with the academy from a former tour of the school, offered through the Partnership's Future Leaders development sessions.

Fun, educational activities were prepared for the sixty children who attended to enjoy. This included a snakes and ladders game themed around recycling provided and led by Lincolnshire County Council.

The HEART team also demonstrated thermal imaging cameras and arranged a hunt for children to find hot and cold areas.

There was an area which showcased solar panels, with the children given the opportunity to build a toy powered by solar.

Children could try a VR headset in an interactive way to learn more about waste management and recycling.

They also had an opportunity to search through a pretend fly-tip to look for evidence to help build a case for prosecution.

Upon arrival, the children were given an 'Eco Hunt' of topics to tick off throughout their session. When completed, they were given a certificate, certifying them as an Eco Superhero, and some additional prizes.

Children were also given a waste & recycling activity pack to do at home and to share what they have learned with their parents and guardians.

The children responded with great enthusiasm to the officers and activities available to them and were given leaflets and flyers to take home. One student had been asking his teacher every day if it is "bin day yet" and he was so excited to see the refuse lorry up close.

## Flood resilience in South and East Lincolnshire

Many areas in South and East Lincolnshire are a long-term risk of flooding, from rivers, the sea, surface water and/or groundwater.

Flooding is dangerous and can happen very quickly, with potentially devastating effects for you, your family and your property.

An effective way to stay aware of the possibility of floods is to sign up for free localised flood warnings online. You can receive flood warnings by landline, text message or email. Signing up can be done at https://www.gov.uk/sign-up-for-flood-warnings.

If your area is at risk of flooding, consider making a plan - prepare a bag with medicines and insurance documents, and consider how you'll get possessions, pets and family to safety. During periods of flooding, it's essential to stay updated with the latest guidance and alerts. The Environment Agency and Lincolnshire Resilience Forum post regularly on Facebook with the latest guidance, as well as flood alerts and warnings.
